

# Introduction

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent lockdowns imposed on the hospitality sector has had a devastating impact on the drinks sector globally. In 2020, beer and cider sales fell significantly as they are mostly commonly consumed in the hospitality sector. Typically around 80% of wine sold in Ireland is consumed at home. Wine's association with home consumption coupled with the hospitality sector lockdowns drove retail wine sales up by 28% in 2020. Total wine sales increased by 12% and there was a 10% increase in per capita consumption. It was estimated that 95% of wine sales are from the retail sector.

In terms of wine's share of the alcohol market, 2020 saw a five-point increase in wine's market share to 32%, mostly at the expense of beer's market share which went from 44% to 38% in 2020. As such, wine comfortably remains the nation's second favourite alcohol beverage. As for the variants, the popularity of rosé continues to grow with an estimated 7% share of the wine market, double its share since 2016. According to industry estimates, wine is still the most popular type of wine with a 48% share with red wine at 45%.

Chilean wines remain the nation's favourite although it's estimated market share fell by 1.7 percentage points to 25.8% of the total wine market share. Spanish wine continues to gain market share with 15.4% share of the total wine market in 2020, just ahead of Australia's 13.8% share. French and Italian wines are the 4th and 5th most popular wines respectively. With the 12 percent increase in wine sales in 2020, all wine countries of origin saw a noticeable rise is sales except for South African wines.

Irish consumers continue to pay more than their EU counterparts for alcohol. One of the reasons for this is because excise rates on alcohol are among the highest in Europe. For wine alone, Irish consumers pay €3.19 per standard bottle (13% ABV) which is the highest in the EU. Of the 28 EU Member States (in 2020), 15 of them charge no duty on wine. Furthermore, sparkling wine gets an additional excise hit totalling to €6.37 on a standard bottle which is effectively a tax on celebrations. Due to these punitive tax rates, Drinks Ireland Wine calls on the government to decrease the excise on wine.

In 2019, the sector paid €425 million in excise to the exchequer which was an increase of €47 million from the previous year. The high excise rates coupled with the increase in sales resulted in wine contributing more excise receipts to the exchequer than any other alcohol variant. Over the past decade wine generated over €3.4 billion to the exchequer in excise alone.

It is unclear if the 2020 sales figures will be replicated for 2021 and beyond, especially as Ireland's hospitality sector is beginning to open where the consumption of wine will shift away from the off-trade sector. What is clear is that wine is firmly the nation's second favourite alcohol beverage and it looks set to stay that way for the foreseeable future.




